Films are the Storytellers of the Past, Present, and Future 10 films: 5 Full-Length Documentaries, 4 Shorts, 1 Animated Feature Film

2019 New York Peace Film Festival

Saturday, March 23 – Sunday, March 24, 2019

New York, NY – The Twelfth Annual New York Peace Film Festival (NYPFF) is a two-day festival that will be cohosted by The Peace & Justice Task Force of All Souls Unitarian Church and held at All Souls Unitarian Church, 1157 Lexington Avenue (between 79th & 80th Streets), on Saturday, March 23 and Sunday, March 24. We'll screen 10 films: five full-length documentaries and 2 documentary shorts, 2 anime shorts, and *In This Corner of the World*, winner of the Japanese Academy Film Prize for Best Animated Film.

In This Corner of the World depicts the wartime life of a young woman who grew up in Hiroshima and moved to Kure, where Kure Naval Arsenal was located. Based on an award-winning manga of the same name by Fumiyo Kono, director Sunao Katabuchi stayed true to every detail, and hand-drawn images swept away our emotions.

This year theme is "Films are the storytellers of the past, present, and future." We'll screen films with topics such as focusing on nuclear issues past and present; how Costa Rica became the first nation in the world to demilitarize for investing in education, health, and the environment; and how a Broadway stage actor became the first World citizen with a World Passport. After each screening, we'll have a Q&A session with filmmakers either in person or via Skype.

Admission is free, so everyone is encouraged to attend! But please obtain a one-day pass via <u>https://nypff2019.eventbrite.com</u>. You can see as many screenings as you wish to see that day; however, seating is on a first-come, first-served basis and subject to capacity. Please arrive early for the best seating.
